

When Mary Gail S. graduated from the University of Montana School of Forestry with a degree in outdoor recreation, she dreamed of working for the National Park Service. But after a season at Grant-Kohrs Ranch National Historic Site, park service openings meant leaving Montana. To tide her over until positions came up in Yellowstone or Glacier, she took a job as a mail clerk at Montana Power Company in her hometown of Butte, Montana. After a week delivering mail, Mary Gail heard about a position in MPC's Environmental Department as a recreation specialist. She applied and got the job.

That was in 1980, and Mary Gail worked with Montana Power until 2000. She became the director of environmental permitting, then hydro licensing and eventually became director of environmental compliance and internal audit.

Mary Gail transitioned into the telecom industry, and in 2013, she was hired by NorthWestern Energy as the Manager of Environmental Permitting and Compliance. The position was very similar to her job with MPC.

"I've had an amazing full-circle career," Mary Gail said.

Mary Gail works with NorthWestern's environmental and lands teams. Her department does everything from fish population studies around our hydro facilities to emissions monitoring at our gas compressor plants to purchasing powerline easements.

Mary Gail recently helped guide the adoption of NorthWestern Energy's Sustainable Procurement and Practices Guidelines. These guidelines, which are outlined on the next page, help the entire company minimize waste.

"This environmental business is everybody's business," Mary Gail said. "It's not just those of us who work in the department who should be focused on environmental sustainability."



## Call before you dig

April 29 is National Arbor Day. Planting a tree is a great way to celebrate, but before you begin any digging project be sure to call 811 or visit call811.com.

Call at least two full business days before you start any digging project to allow time for all underground utilities to be marked.

Even on your property and in your yard, damages caused by hitting an underground utility can be expensive and even deadly. Once utilities are marked, be sure to hand excavate within 18 inches on each side of markings.

If you ever hit a gas line, call 911 and NorthWestern Energy immediately. Even minor damage to a pipeline can result in future leaks.



# New guidelines focus on sustainability

In 2019, a group of NorthWestern Energy employees proposed the company take steps to make our offices and operating divisions more environmentally friendly and sustainable. Their efforts led to the formation of a cross-functional committee and ultimately the development of Sustainable Procurement and Practices Guidelines.

NorthWestern officially adopted these guidelines in January. The objective of the guidelines is to give preference to products and services that are environmentally preferred. The guidelines provide concrete points of focus for our sustainability efforts. Our new guidelines call for purchasing products that contain recycled content and avoiding items that cannot be reused. They encourage eco-friendly cleaning products, reusing and recycling technology equipment and striving to reduce unnecessary energy use in our offices and work locations.



## Plan before you plant

A healthy tree might live for a century or more, so be sure you're planting the right tree in the right place.

- Before you plant a tree, know where overhead power lines are located and plant at least 20 feet away. Trees that grow taller than 40 feet should be planted more than 35 feet away.
- Be sure trees are also planted at least 20 feet away from buried gas lines. Roots can become tangle around pipelines causing damage, and if the tree should blow over, it can damage the pipeline if the roots become entwine and pull up the pipeline.
- If your yard has a ground-level transformer (a large, green, metal box), be sure to leave room for our crews to access the transformer. Plant your shrubs at least 10 feet away from the front, and 2 feet away from the sides and back.

## Earth Day is April 22

Celebrate Earth Day with these activities to help you be energy efficient and environmentally conscious. These are tips you can implement on Earth Day and every day!

- Replace old incandescent light bulbs with LED bulbs.
- Make a meal in the slow cooker. Slow cookers use less energy than the oven.
- Turn off the heated drying feature on your dishwasher.
- Instead of turning on the TV, play outside or play a board game.
- Rather than using a disposable plastic bag, put your lunch or leftovers in a reusable container.
- Plant a seed.
- Headed somewhere within walking distance? Skip the car and walk or bike instead.
- Turn off the lights when you leave a room.
- Unplug a device charger as soon as your device is fully charged.
- Install a water aerator on one high-use faucet.
- Look for air leaks around doors and windows and seal them with caulk or insulation.
- Set your hot water heater to 120 degrees.
- Take a shower instead of a bath. On average, a shower uses about half as much hot water as a bath.
- Instead of starting the dryer, hang clothes outside.
