



Pipeline right-of-way and markers

A pipeline right-of-way is the land governed by an easement agreement between a pipeline operator and a landowner or government agency. The right-of-way allows the operator to access the pipeline for maintenance, emergency response and inspections.

Markers show the approximate location of pipelines and identify the companies that operate them. The pipeline may not follow a straight course between markers, which is why it's important to always call 811 before digging.

Pipeline Safety Facts

Pipelines are the safest way to transport energy products, including natural gas, crude oil and other fuels. The U.S. Department of Transportation's Pipeline & Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA) regulates pipelines with the help of state partners.

According to government and industry statistics, the most common cause of pipeline incidents is improper or unauthorized digging near a pipeline, which is why it's important to call 811 before you dig. Pipeline operators carefully build, maintain and monitor the integrity and security of their lines.

How to use white markings in winter

Planning a digging project this winter? The first step before calling 811, is to mark your proposed excavation area with white paint. However, that can be tricky in the winter. If there's snow on the ground, pink is also an approved color you can use to mark the proposed excavation.

Once utilities are marked, be sure to hand excavate within 18 inches on each side of markings.
